



SAN JOSÉ STATE PROGRESS ON GI 2025 INITIATIVE

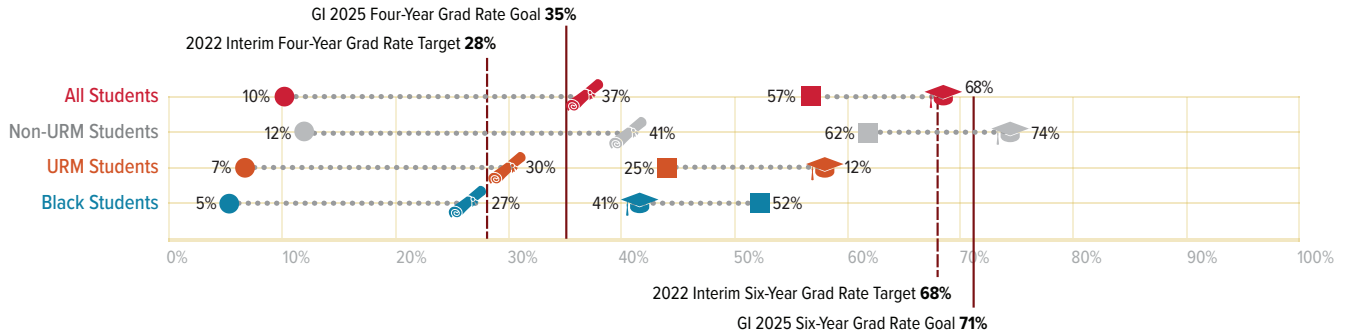
At San José State, the four-year graduation rate for all first-time students has more than tripled, increasing from 10% to 37%, and the six-year graduation rate has increased from 57% to 68% since 2015. Gaps persist between non-URM students and URM students, whose graduation rates are 11 points lower after four years and 16 points lower after six years. The gaps are even larger when comparing Black students to non-URM students at 14 points lower after four years and 22 points lower after six.

For transfer students, the two-year graduation rate has increased from 24% to 34% and the four-year graduation rate from 70% to 80%. There is a small gap between URM and non-URM students with URM students having a two-year rate three points lower than non-URM students and a four-year gap one point lower. Black transfer students have larger gaps with rates compared to non-URM students that are seven points lower after both two years and four years.

San José has set one of its campuswide goals for GI 2025 at rates above the systemwide goals. **The campus is currently on track to reach all four of its own GI 2025 goals and two of the systemwide goals while falling just shy of the interim target for a third.**

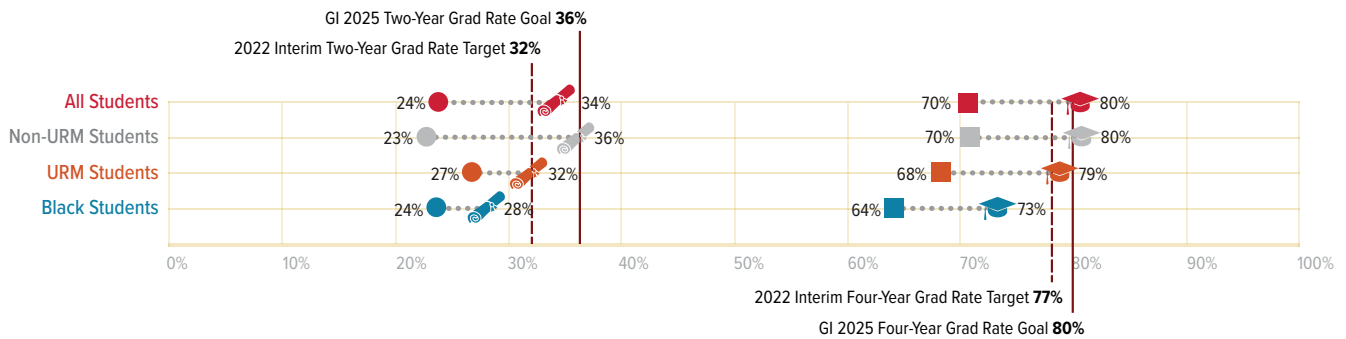
Four- and Six-Year Graduation Rates for First-Time Students
